Statue of Liberty Facts

The Statue of Liberty stands on Liberty Island in New York Harbor. This 12-acre island was formerly called Bedloe's Island until President Eisenhower approved a resolution in 1956 to change its name. The Statue of Liberty was given to the United States by France as a symbol of friendship and liberty.

At the base of the statue stands the American Museum of Immigration, which is filled with many reminders of the history of American immigration.

The statue was sent to the United States in many pieces. After it was assembled, it stood to a height of 151 feet and 1 inch from the base to the torch. Altogether it weighs 225 tons.

Close by Liberty Island is Ellis Island. Until 1954, many immigrants were required to stay here until they were allowed to enter the country.
